Artisans and service providers played essential roles in rural society, supplying goods and services locally. During the colonial period, this system began to weaken due to the introduction of industrial goods, altered trade patterns, and economic policies that favored mass production. Traditional artisans struggled to compete with cheaper factory-made goods, leading to a gradual decline in many occupations.

1. The Colonial Era (19th & 20th Centuries)

Deindustrialization: British economic policies favored raw material exports and machine-made imports. This devastated traditional handicrafts, cotton handlooms, indigenous iron smelting, and indigo dyeing.

Agrarian Disruption: Changes in land revenue and taxation structures forced many into crippling debt, transforming hereditary farmers and artisans into landless laborers or tenant farmers.

2. Post-Independence Shifts (1950s–1980s)

Land Reforms: While the Karnataka Land Reforms Act abolished tenancy and gave land to the tiller, population growth led to fragmented holdings. The average operational land size dropped, making traditional sustenance farming less viable. **Mechanization:** The Green Revolution and increased mechanization marginalized smaller farmers and traditional agricultural labourers.

3. Globalization and the IT Boom (1990s–Present)

Structural Diversification: The rise of Bengaluru as a global tech hub shifted economic focus to services. Traditional rural economies struggled to compete with the rapid wage growth and opportunities in urban, capital-intensive sectors.

Resource and Market Challenges: Traditional livelihoods in coastal fishing and bamboo/cane weaving (e.g., the Meda tribe) have suffered due to modernization, overfishing, and mass-produced substitutes.
