According to the data, women's voting involvement has significantly increased throughout the years. Female voter turnout in the 2019 Lok Sabha election was roughly 67.18%, while male voter turnout was 67.02%, indicating a significant reduction in the gender gap in electoral participation. Reservations in urban local bodies and Panchayati Raj institutions have also given women more chances, which has helped to grow grassroots political leadership. However, there is still a significant disparity between women's representation in legislative and executive institutions and their electoral participation. Women are still underrepresented among senior party leadership, ministries, members of parliament, and politicians. Women's political growth is nevertheless constrained by social and cultural conventions, patriarchal views, a lack of financial resources, unequal access to political networks, family obligations, and prejudice based on gender. According to the study, gender equality in politics cannot be ensured by merely boosting voter turnout. Equal chances for leadership, representation, candidacy, and decision-making are necessary for meaningful political empowerment. More substantive political equality can be achieved by bolstering political education, institutional support, gender-sensitive party structures, financial accessibility, and anti-discrimination measures.
